Day 8:

Keeping in Touch with Past Customers

Why This Matters

Most electricians focus only on getting new customers—but forget to stay in touch with the ones they've already impressed.

That's a massive missed opportunity.

Past customers already trust you. If you stay in contact, they're more likely to:

- ✓ Call you again for future work
- Recommend you to friends and neighbours
- ✓ Leave reviews or respond to upsells

This step aligns with **Keep-in-Touch (K)** and **Relationships (R)** in the S.P.A.R.K.S Blueprint. Marketing isn't just about leads—it's about retention and referrals too.

Staying in touch doesn't have to be complicated. A few simple systems can keep you top of mind all year round.



Step-by-Step Instructions

Step 1: Start with a Basic Customer List

Use your CRM or diary to gather:

- Names
- > Emails and/or mobile numbers
- Job type and date completed

If you're using the ToolBox CRM or SBD, you can import these easily and tag them accordingly.

Step 2: Choose 1 or 2 "Keep-In-Touch" Methods

Here are simple ways to stay connected:

- ➤ A monthly email newsletter with seasonal tips, safety reminders, or new services
- > Reminders for important dates like EICRs, RCD tests, smoke alarm replacements
- Occasional texts with service updates, booking availability, or "it's time to check" alerts
- > Christmas cards, birthday texts, or 'thank you' messages (if appropriate)

You don't need to do them all. Start with one method, done well.





Step 3: Automate Where Possible

Use the ToolBox CRM to:

- > Set annual service reminders
- > Tag customers by job type (e.g. rewires, landlord reports, consumer units)
- > Send out pre-written email campaigns or text follow-ups
- > Set calendar reminders for key customers or contract renewals

↑ Common Mistakes to Avoid

- X Only contacting customers when you want more work
- X Sending irrelevant or generic sales messages
- X Forgetting to track when you last contacted someone
- X Not collecting emails or phone numbers after each job
